2021 CORE MODEL GRANTS POLICY

National CASA/GAL Association will sub-award \$2.25 million to local programs and state direct service organizations.

Grants must be issued in at least 38 states.

The award is for one 1-year grant period covering July 1, 2021 - June 30, 2022.


Grant awards may range from \$30,000 to \$60,000 for a one-year grant term.





CORE MODEL GRANT GOALS

The overall goal is to expand best interest advocacy to more youth and children ages 0-17; all youth and children in foster care are identified as at-risk or high-risk for involvement in the juvenile justice system.





OVERALL GOALS FOR CORE MODEL GRANT

- 1600 from rural areas

GRANT REQUIREMENTS

- Grantees will have behavioral and life skills reporting obligations to our partnering entity, Child Trends
- Grantees will partner with National CASA/GAL to offer training to their volunteers on cultural competency and as applicable:
 - working with families impacted by opioid abuse,
 - working with youth with incarcerated parents and
 - working with youth who are at risk for bullying and cyberbullying





REPORTING & TRACKING REQUIREMENTS

IF AWARDED PROGRAMS WILL HAVE TO COMMIT TO THE FOLLOWING REPORTING REQUIREMENTS:

- New volunteers (recruited, screened, trained, and assigned) Refer to the Funding and Goal Requirements for the projected number of new volunteers depending on the grant award amount.
- New youth who are age 17 or younger Refer to the Funding and Goal Requirements table for the projected number of additional youth and children served depending on the grant award amount.
- Tracking in general and specifically one or more of the following target populations:

 - Youth and children in rural, tribal and/or urban areas
 - Opioid-Impacted Youth
 - Youth and children with Incarcerated Parents
 - Youth and children at risk of Bullying or Cyberbullying





GRANT GOALS/TARGETS

GRANT AWARD CONDITIONS

- Submit monthly expense reports
- Submit quarterly new volunteers assigned and children served counts
- Submit semi-annual and final narrative reports
- Submit Volunteer Knowledge Pre and Post Surveys (for volunteers trained in Fostering Futures Training Curriculum), Youth Life Skills Assessments Pre and Post Surveys (for youth 14-17 and their volunteers) throughout the grant period
- Submit semi-annual grantee data reports
- Maintain worksheet throughout the grant period on data collection for the grant
- Take part in regularly scheduled accountability calls with designated National CASA/GAL Association staff if selected (frequency TBD)
- Take part in desks audits and/or onsite/virtual monitoring as requested
- Take part in mandatory grant trainings and webinars (TBD)

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

National CASA/GAL Grant Funding

All member programs in good standing with the National CASA/GAL Association are eligible to apply for grant funding and must be current on membership renewal, submission of the 2020 annual survey and program six-month reporting, remain in compliance with National CASA/GAL Association Standards and have successfully executed on previous National CASA/GAL grants.

Funding typically comes to National CASA/GAL from the organizations below:

- A cooperative agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), which includes funding for the
 purpose of increasing the number of abused and neglected children who are assigned a CASA volunteer or volunteer guardian ad litem (GAL) to advocate for their
 best interests.
- A National Mentoring Grant awarded by the OJJDP.
- Jewelers for Children (JFC) continues its support of CASA/GAL volunteer advocacy. Since 2003, JFC has contributed more than \$9 million in funding.

The National CASA/GAL Association is authorized to distribute funds through a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), under the Victims of Child Abuse Act (P.L. 101-647), for the purpose of increasing the number of abused and neglected children assigned a CASA volunteer or volunteer guardian ad litem (GAL) to advocate for their best interests. These are federal funds and may only be used to serve children who have experienced abuse or neglect and are the subject of civil child abuse proceedings.

All federal funds are contingent on an annual appropriation by Congress and subsequent approval by OJJDP.

Introduction

Through a competitive national grants process, National CASA/GAL Association was awarded a \$2.5 million National Mentoring Program grant through the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). Sub-awards covering a one-year grant period will be awarded to local programs and/or direct service state organizations in at least 38 states in the sum of \$2.25 million.

The overall goal of the National Mentoring Grant is to expand best interest advocacy to more children with a particular emphasis on a number of specific target populations.

In addition to the general population of children served by CASA/GAL programs, target populations for the Core Model grants are:

- children or youth ages 0-17 identified as at-risk or high-risk for involvement in the juvenile justice system*;
- American Indian and Alaska Native (Al/AN) children or youth;
- children or youth living in rural and/or tribal communities;
- · children or youth impacted by the opioid crisis;
- · children or youth with incarcerated parents; and
- children or youth at risk for bullying or cyberbullying

*Please note that for the purposes of this grant, all youth in foster care are considered at-risk for involvement in the juvenile justice system.

We encourage all members identified as eligible to apply as it is important that we provide support to as many member programs as possible through this and other grants cycles. Member programs in good standing with the National CASA/GAL Association are eligible to be awarded grant funding. These programs must be current on their membership renewal, submit the 2020 annual survey and program six-month reporting, remain in compliance with National CASA/GAL Association Standards and have experience with successful execution on previous National CASA/GAL grants. All funds are contingent on receipt of funds by the U.S. Congress and subsequent funding by OJJDP.


